Congress designated March 25th as National Medal of Honor Day in 1990 to foster public appreciation and recognition of Medal of Honor recipients. The first Medals of Honor were presented on March 25, 1863, to six members of the Andrews Raiders.

It is with great pride that I am able to forward to all of our Chapter members this special issue of the newsletter honoring one of our chapter members, Medal of Honor recipient Col. Jack Jacobs. March 25 is dedicated as National Medal of Honor Day and it seemed fitting that the Chapter devote this special edition of the newsletter to Jack. The chapter has benefitted by hearing Col. Jacobs speak at several chapter events, including the most recent West Point Marathon Team Football breakfast conducted in Ringoes, NJ. Jack's stories of his experiences, both while in the military and while an instructor at West Point are always entertaining and a "you don't want to miss this" experience. It is been a great honor to have been able to meet Jack and to be able to be in his presence at our events.

Member Highlight Jack Jacobs Medal of Honor Citation

For conspicuous gallantry and intrepidity in action at the risk of his life above and beyond the call of duty. Capt. Jacobs (then 1st Lt.), Infantry, distinguished himself while serving as assistant battalion adviser, 2d Battalion, 16th Infantry, 9th Infantry Division, Army of the Republic of Vietnam. The 2d Battalion was advancing to contact when it came under intense heavy machine-gun and mortar fire from a Viet Cong battalion positioned in well-fortified bunkers. As the 2d Battalion deployed into attack formation, its advance was halted by devastating fire. Capt. Jacobs, with the command element of the lead company, called for and directed air strikes on the enemy positions to facilitate a renewed attack. Due to the intensity of the enemy fire and heavy casualties to the command group, including the company commander, the attack stopped and the friendly troops became disorganized. Although wounded by mortar fragments, Capt. Jacobs assumed command of the allied company, ordered a withdrawal from the exposed position, and established a defensive perimeter. Despite profuse bleeding from head wounds which impaired his vision, Capt. Jacobs, with complete disregard for his safety, returned under intense fire to evacuate a seriously wounded adviser to the safety of a wooded area where he administered lifesaving first aid. He then returned through heavy automatic-weapons fire to evacuate the wounded company commander. Capt. Jacobs made repeated trips across the fireswept, open rice paddies, evacuating wounded and their weapons. On three separate occasions, Capt. Jacobs contacted and drove off Viet Cong squads who were searching for allied wounded and weapons, single-handedly killing three and wounding several others. His gallant actions and extraordinary heroism saved the lives of one U.S. adviser and 13 allied soldiers. Through his effort the allied company was restored to an effective fighting unit and prevented defeat of the friendly forces by a strong and determined enemy. Capt. Jacobs, by his gallantry and bravery in action in the highest traditions of the military service, has reflected great credit upon himself, his unit, and the U.S. Army.

Jack Jacobs Biographical Information

Jack was born on August 2, 1945 in Brooklyn, NY. In the 1950's, his family moved to Fords, in Woodbridge Township, NJ where he went to school and graduated from Woodbridge Senior High School in 1962. Jack then attended Rutgers University, where he earned both Bachelor of Arts and Master of Arts degrees. A member of the Rutger's Army Reserve Officer Training Corps program, he entered military service as a second lieutenant in 1966. In the course of his military career, Jack served as a platoon leader in the 82nd Airborne Division, a battalion executive officer in the 7th Infantry Division, and a battalion commander with the 10th Infantry Regiment in Panama. He spent two tours of duty in Vietnam, both times as an advisor to infantry units in the Army of the Republic of Vietnam. In addition to the Medal of Honor, he received two Silver Stars, three Bronze Star Medals, and two Purple Hearts in Vietnam. In his memoir, Jack recounts that he had to use subterfuge to return to a combat role in Vietnam after being awarded the Medal of Honor, as the military was unwilling to assign Medal of Honor recipients to combat roles. Jack was a faculty member at the United States Military Academy in West Point, teaching international relations and comparative politics for three years, from 1973 to 1976, and at the National War College in Washington, D.C. He retired from the army in 1987 as a colonel. Jack two books, "If Not Now, When. Duty and Sacrifice in America's Time of Need" and "Basic: Surviving Boot Camp and Basic Training" are excellent reads and highly recommended.

Medal of Honor History

President Abraham Lincoln signed legislation creating the Army's Medal of Honor on July 12, 1862. On March 25, 1863, Secretary of War Edwin Stanton presented the first Medals of Honor to six surviving members of the Andrew's Raiders, who had attempted to disrupt a railroad supply line in Georgia. The first Medal of Honor ever awarded was to Private Jacob Parrott. The one and only woman that was awarded the Medal of Honor was Mary E. Walker, who received the award for her actions as a contract surgeon, and subsequent prisoner of war, during the Civil War. Currently there are 3547 awardings of the Medal of Honor; with 19 individuals receiving the medal twice, all 19 which had taken place for actions in World War I or earlier. At the time of this writing there are 61 living individuals who have been awarded the Medal of Honor. The Medal of Honor is also bestowed on the US Unknown Soldiers. The unknown soldiers of the US allies of World War One, Belgium, France, Great Britain, Italy and Romania, were awarded the Medal Honor; the only to a foreign countries' military.
